

2016 WAS A RECORD BREAKING YEAR for the REED fund, with 21 loans issued and an additional 15 loan commitments carrying forward to 2017. The trend has continued in 2017 with an additional 16 loans approved and 10 more loans issued through June 2017.

The total activity to date since January 2016 is over \$24 million. And that's not all, there are numerous loans in the pipeline and more inquiries come in weekly.

NEW FUNDING FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES

In December 2016 REED Fund was awarded \$10,000,000 by the US Department of Agriculture, Rural Development for re-lending for community facilities such as education, health care, community centers, fire protection and emergency services. Clear Lake Building Center

H-D Electric Cooperative's REED Fund forged a partnership with a local bank and other regional loan funds to help the Clear Lake Building and Rental Center transition to new owners. Brothers Daron and Dustin Kreger purchased the business from owners who are retiring after 43 years in business. The brothers have worked at the Clear Lake Building and Rental Center for over five years and continue to provide the same quality services the community has come to rely upon, plus expanding the hardware business and adding a full line of rental equipment.



Do Mats, Inc.



REED member Agralite Electric Cooperative is proud to be a part of the financing package to construct a new home for Do Mat's Family Food. The grocery store has been a family business in Benson, Minnesota for nearly 45 years. Do Mats' CEO is the son of the original owner, and employs 20 people. Its new, 23,500 square foot facility includes a Lewis Drug pharmacy and a liquor store (operated by the city) all under one roof, including energy efficient fixtures and equipment.

Sunset Adventures

Kingsbury Electric Cooperative's REED Fund was part of the initial financing package when Sunset Adventures constructed a 37-room motel with an indoor pool and a meeting space in 2003. In 2016, REED partnered with a local bank to provide additional financing to complete a room upgrade. De Smet, home to Laura Ingalls Wilder of Little House on the Prairie fame, hosts thousands of visitors each year and numerous activities at its new Event Center requiring overnight lodging.



AGRI-BUSINESS

Tractors and Trucks

Lake Region Electric
Cooperative's REED Fund and a
local bank helped Don Wolter
relocate his truck and tractor
repair business from his farm
to a new, 19,200 square foot
facility on 4 acres along US
Hwy 12 in Webster, SD. His
expanded business includes
buying and selling equipment
for local farmers.



Prescription Agronomics, LLC



This Ipswich, South Dakota based fertilizer company is a joint venture between North Central Farmer's Elevator Cooperative and John Guerard. Started in 2001, it specializes in blending liquid fertilizer products for local agriculture producers. FEM Electric Association's REED Fund loan is part of a package that helped the company to increase raw product storage capacity, upgrade equipment and construct additional facilities.

South Dakota Pulse Processors

Oahe Electric Cooperative's REED loan to South Dakota Pulse Processors was part of a financial package to purchase and install equipment for a startup plant engaged in processing legumes. The plant uses dry milling and dry splitting processes and markets into domestic US food markets as well as Mexico, Central America and the pet food market in the Midwest. The plant has 85 investors who are primarily agricultural producers who sell locallygrown legumes to the plant. The plant, located in Harrold, SD, employs 11 persons.





Pierre Economic Development Corp.

As a startup company, South Dakota Pulse Processors felt that owning both a facility and purchasing equipment would be cost prohibitive. With the assistance of Oahe Electric Cooperative's REED Fund and a local bank, Pierre Economic **Development Corporation stepped** in to build the 10,000 square foot facility for lease to Pulse Processors. Nonprofit development corporations in this region often play the role of facility owner due to lack of commercial developers in the region.



Lake Area Improvement Corp.

With assistance from Sioux Valley Energy's REED Fund, a Sioux Valley Energy sponsored USDA 0% loan* and other partners, Lake Area Improvement Corporation (LAIC)., based in Madison, SD, constructed a 20,000 square foot building in 2015 to provide space for growing or attracting businesses. A local entrepreneur purchased the facility in 2016 to grow his manufacturing business.

SDSU Growth Partnership

SDSU Growth Partnership received a loan from Sioux Valley Energy's REED Fund for the SDSU Research Park, a 125 acre business park with a 40,000 square foot research facility, located on the South Dakota State University Campus. The research park is a joint venture of South Dakota State University, Brookings Economic Development Corporation, Vision Brookings, the City of Brookings, Brookings County, the SDSU Foundation and private investors. The research facility has facilitated creation of over 140 jobs to date.



HEALTH CARE & EDUCATION

Horizon Health Care

Horizon Health Care provides personalized, affordable, high quality health care through a rural community-based network of federally-qualified health care centers in South Dakota. Horizon opened Aberdeen Community Health Center in 2014 and, with assistance from a Northern Electric Cooperative sponsored USDA 0% interest loan,* was able to purchase and renovate a larger facility and add a second provider. This is the fourth



Horizon Health Care facility to receive financing from REED members for medical and dental facilities that serve individuals and families on a sliding fee program, offering reduced prices on office visits and clinic services to all individuals and families who qualify.

The City of Emery, South Dakota



The City of Emery, South Dakota, has owned and operated a child care center since 2000 in a building leased from the school district. When the city learned that the building was slated to be removed for school expansion, it approached Central Electric Cooperative's REED Fund and a partner loan fund for financing to purchase and renovate a facility for Little Learner's Preschool and Daycare. The new building is 3,200 square feet and provides space for the center, to expand.

Huron Regional Medical Center

Huron Regional Medical Center (HRMC) is a Critical Access Hospital licensed for 25 beds. Dakota Energy Cooperative sponsored a USDA 0% loan* to assist HRMC in purchasing computer infrastructure to increase security and storage along with a system for electronic medical records, back-up capacity and disaster recovery features to improve patient services.




R-S Fiber Cooperative

R-S Fiber Cooperative brought together 10 towns and 17 townships to construct a fiber optic network to provide world class broadband communications in central Minnesota, in what is now considered a model project. The local government entities provided initial financing under a joint powers agreement and brought in Renville-Sibley Cooperative Power's REED Fund, a Renville-Sibley sponsored USDA 0% loan*, a consortium of local banks and private investors to complete the



\$21 million package. Today R-S Fiber serves over 1,500 member-customers with reasonably-priced 50 Mbps to 1 GB broadband service. It continues to add members in the over 700 square mile area on its way reaching up to 6,200 households, farms and other businesses in a region unserved and underserved by broadband communications.





Wolsey Fire Protection District and first responder rescue squad serves the town of Wolsey, South Dakota and the surrounding eight townships covering 260 square miles. With financing from Dakota Energy Cooperative's REED Fund and their sponsorship of a USDA 0% loan*, the district constructed a 6,400 square foot facility capable of holding all of its vehicles plus a training room, storage room, office and restrooms.

Franklin Industries

Franklin, Minnesota, population 500, was in dire need of a community center and a child care center. Franklin Industries was created by local citizens to develop a facility to serve both needs for lease to the city of Franklin for the community center and the school district to operate the child care center. Renville-Sibley Cooperative Power's REED Fund provided financing in partnership with a local bank. The facility shares a common kitchen for efficiency.



Deuel Area Development, Inc.





Financing from a USDA zero-interest loan sponsored by H-D Electric Cooperative assisted with extending infrastructure to Wildlife Estates for the purpose of stimulating economic development by providing access to lots for housing development, thus attracting new residents to live and work in the Clear Lake area. Existing housing stock is deteriorating and inadequate to attract new permanent residents. When people come to town for employment and can't secure local housing, they are forced to commute an average of 30 miles one way, and often will continue seeking employment elsewhere. Frequent turnover of commuting employees leads to a less stable/long term workforce that is costly for business in terms of training expense and reduced productivity.

Beadle & Spink Enterprise Community



Beadle and Spink Enterprise Community (BASEC) is a regional nonprofit serving a 1,000 square mile region with 7 communities under 300 persons. It began as a federally-designated "Enterprise Community," and chose to invest its \$3 million initial capital in a revolving loan fund. BASEC has financed over 108 business and 213 homes in the past

21 years. Northern Electric Cooperative's REED Fund loan provided supplemental capital to match a state grant to expand BASEC's home ownership loan program to meet immediate demand in the region. BASEC is the only "Enterprise Community" in the nation that has sustained operations beyond the original 10-year designation period.

* The USDA Rural Development, Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant program provides competitive grants to eligible borrowers of the Rural Utilities Service. The grants must be passed on to pre-approved, eligible projects as 10-year term 0% interest loans. The repayments of the loans are retained in a 'revolving loan fund'-REED Fund-to benefit projects in rural areas. REED Fund's members obtain the funds; REED fund services the loans and makes additional loans with the revolved funds. This program is one of 12 sources of capital in the REED Fund.
